## **Deafblind Service celebrates 20th anniversary**

Our Deafblind Reablement Service, which supports people with a dual sensory impairment, is celebrating its 20th anniversary.

Our highly trained staff provide vital support, and aim to teach mobility and communication skills so that people with dual sensory loss can remain as independent and active as possible.

Since starting as a trial 20 years ago, Deafblind Reablement has grown into a fully-fledged service. Lynda has been supported by the service since it first started, said:

"Vista's support has given me the confidence to access the community. It is a circle of independence, confidence, assertiveness and self-respect."



"I cannot imagine life without the service – I would be a very different person to who I am now. With the support of someone who understands dual sensory loss, I can make informed choices in my own time."

#### Eye screening in primary schools

This year we have developed and launched a pilot programme in two primary schools in Leicester to raise awareness about eye health with young children and their parents, and carry out eye screenings. This is something that does not currently happen in Leicester or Leicestershire, so is both an exciting and vital project for us to undertake.

We have also secured three year funding from BBC Children in Need to continue our children and young people's services.

#### **Vision Pioneer Awards**

In June, our Family Support Officer Paula Varney was crowned Professional of the Year (Children and Young People) at the Vision Pioneer Awards, which celebrates the outstanding work of professionals in the eye health and sight loss sectors across the UK. Naomi Bell, Eye Clinic Liaison Officer based in the Leicester Royal Infirmary Eye Clinic, was also a finalist in the Professional

of the Year (Adults) category.

Paula said: "I'm absolutely delighted - the fact that Naomi and I were both named as finalists in these national awards was already a great achievement, and to be crowned the winner was the icing on the cake. I cannot take all the credit, as it's thanks to the amazing team I work with that we're able to provide this valuable service."



#### **Mobile Support Service**

Over the last twelve months, our Mobile Support Service has travelled to over 200 Leicestershire county locations and made over 70 visits to Rutland villages in order to spread the word about preventing avoidable sight loss. We have engaged with over 450 people, with 275 of these not previously known to us.

# **New Wycliffe Home crowned Care Home of the Year**

#### **Charity partnership with Design Studio Architects**

Over the last few months we have been developing a charity partnership with local company Design Studio Architects. Using their skills we have been able to create a fantastic new living space at New Wycliffe Home, for a fraction of the cost.

The new open plan lounge and dining area includes a range of furnishings and decorations, designed to generate nostalgia and help people with dementia to feel more familiar in their surroundings.

It also has several smaller seating and dining areas to create a more comfortable setting, where residents can relax in an armchair or eat a meal side by side.





### **Butterfly Garden launch**

A new garden specifically designed to meet the needs of older people with sight loss and dementia has been unveiled at our New Wycliffe Home.

The Butterfly Garden follows on from the launch of the Home's Butterfly Lounge last year, a multifunctional living space that has made the home a Department of Health "Beacon Site" for improving dementia care.




